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A Message from the Executive Director

Dear NECS Community,

Looking back on 2024, we are filled with gratitude and pride for a remarkable year of growth, creativity, and community impact. We began the year with transformative staff training and our first annual retreat, bringing teaching artists and staff together to reflect and recharge.

Our theater students showcased courage and artistry in their *Giants in the Sky* production, performing for an audience of over 300. Spring brought deep learning and reflection as five students and three adults embarked on a Civil Rights Journey to Alabama and Atlanta, capturing their experience in a student-produced video. We also hosted our first Girls' Wellness Summit, fostering self-care, empowerment, and connection.

A significant milestone came in May, when we signed a lease for our new creative hub at 203 Esther Street in downtown Peekskill. Over the summer, we welcomed students for a six-week Nature Connection Camp and global learning experiences—including a life-changing trip to The Gambia. In the fall, our new space became home to expanded programs in mixed media, theater, comics, film, and more, while our film students gained recognition at the New Hampshire Film Festival. We were honored with awards for our commitment to equity, inclusion, and creativity, including **Westchester's Small Nonprofit Changemaker Award** and **ArtsWestchester's Advancing Equity Award**.

Now more than ever, spaces like NECS are essential. In times of strife, our community needs places where young people can express themselves and find belonging. Thanks to your continued support, NECS remains a vibrant home for creativity, learning, and empowerment. As we look ahead, we are excited to build on this momentum and deepen our impact in 2025.

It served as an excellent opportunity to strengthen ties with our community.

Pastor James Perry delivered an inspiring speech, and our film students presented Untold Stories, a documentary capturing their transformative journey to Alabama and Atlanta.



Rooted in camaraderie and a sense of purpose, the retreat provided a dedicated space to envision the culture we strive to cultivate—for ourselves, our students, and their families. Through thoughtful discussions and collaboration, we reaffirmed our commitment to fostering an inclusive, supportive, and inspiring environment.

To derive joy from intellectual and creative pursuits is one of the key aims of our programs.



In May, NECS hosted the Just Girls Wellness Summit, a transformative one-day event designed to inspire, educate, and empower young girls. Held at Blue Mountain Reserve, 15 girls formed an overnight community in a cozy lodge, engaging in jewelry-making, a spa night, and meaningful discussions on self-care, healthy relationships, racism, and domestic violence. A local photographer guided them in using self-portraits to build self-esteem. Both participants and facilitators joyfully felt the summit's impact, sparking excitement for next year and drawing new girls to our Girls EmpowerEd program.

Summer was filled with joy as we welcomed over 30 enthusiastic students to our new downtown Peekskill location, the heart of local activities. For six weeks, laughter and adventure filled the air as students roasted s'mores, played games, hiked, swam, gardened, and explored the water through paddleboarding and kayaking.

Divided into Explorers (K-2nd grade), Discoverers (3rd-5th grade), and Pathfinders (6th-8th grade), students embraced new challenges every day. This year's special highlight was our guest nutritionist, who taught the importance of healthy eating and guided students in preparing meals for seniors at the Peekskill Nutrition Center. Another favorite moment was our mini Olympics, led by Coach Ted, where students competed in fun, high-energy challenges. This summer was about growth, connection, and endless summer fun!


justice

To be equitable, accessible, and inclusive is a fundamental expression of our commitment to justice.



Over spring break, we embarked on a transformative journey to Alabama and Atlanta, reaffirming the vital role of truth-telling in teaching youth about justice. Five students and three adults traveled to deepen their understanding of history, beginning in Atlanta with visits to the King Center and the Human Rights Museum, where they also engaged in meaningful dialogue with civil rights activist and artist Masud Olufani.

In Alabama, our students spent four immersive days exploring Montgomery, Selma, and Birmingham, walking in the footsteps of history and learning firsthand from historians, artists, and activists. This experience was more than a trip—it was an act of bearing witness, connecting the past to the present, and empowering the next generation to carry forward the work of justice. The journey culminated in a powerful [student-produced video](#) by Alyssa Copeland and Tyler Dehm, capturing their reflections and insights.

NECS expresses its commitment to humanity through community service.



In July, our students embraced the power of service through global cultural immersion. As part of our Girls EmpowerEd partnership with Starfish International, five students traveled to The Gambia to engage with the local community, learn about advocacy, and build meaningful connections with African peers. Their journey aligned with a historic moment as The Gambia upheld its ban on female genital mutilation, deepening its understanding of social justice and the role of activism in creating change.

Executive Director Ridvan Idara led a Healthy Masculinity workshop for Starfish International's young men. The workshop facilitated critical conversations on reducing violence against women and cultivating respect and accountability. Through these experiences, our students and leaders learned from others and contributed to a global movement of empowerment and change.

Financial Report



We're proud to have extended scholarships to every child who requested support, ensuring that all interested participants had access to our programs.


Economic Impact


Growth: Income & Expense
